Mission:

The Trenton Prevention Policy Board makes and implements policy, program and practice recommendations to promote positive youth development and prevent juvenile delinquency in the City of Trenton.

About:

The Trenton Prevention Policy Board (TPPB) is a grassroots effort that aims to reduce juvenile delinquency and promote positive youth development in the capital city. Local stakeholders gather together to share their knowledge about policies, programs, services and best practices so they can make informed recommendations to municipal, county and state officials.

Supported by the New Jersey Attorney General's Office of Community Justice and the Fund for New Jersey and facilitated by The College of New Jersey's Bonner Institute for Civic and Community Engagement, the TPPB is part of a statewide effort known as the Municipal Policy Planning Board Initiative.

Municipal Planning Boards also operate in Asbury Park, Atlantic City, Camden, Newark, and Vineland. Like the TPPB, these boards recognize that community empowerment and multilevel collaboration are needed to positively address local issues of crime and delinquency
